



What's Happened in 2023-So Far!



World-performing musicians, pianist Daniel Shulman and his wife, violinist Kaori Washiyama, presented three classical chamber music concerts in the courtroom this spring. The concerts were always a transcendant experience enhanced by the historical and

musical background Shulman presented in introducing the music. They were joined by accomplished guest musicians. Audiences of 25 to 30 people turned out to take advantage of each concert.



The Shoppe's mission beyond The Shoppe's mission beyond offering fantastic bargains to treasure hunters is "to support activities that would provide a solid, worthwhile experience for the children and their families that would otherwise be unavailable."

The Shoppe donated \$10,000 to support the 5-week Lunch, Learn + Play program. Another \$10,000 covered the expenses for new, durable tents to provide cover for LL+P, the July 4th Carnival and other Courthouse community activities. The Shoppe supported scholarships for Salem graduates, field trips, supplies for teachers and students, and the Girls on the Run program. Since inception, the Shoppe has given over \$300,000 to support the Salem community.



The Great Hall Gallery hosted 6 exhibits so far this year starting with Jade Miner, a recent college graduate who displayed her amazing computer-generated creations. The February Quilt Show created a sense of warmth on a grand scale, as did

Randy Squires' natural arrangements. Susie Kane Kettlewell's show of compelling abstracts was well attended and brought in over \$1500 to benefit the courthouse. Gabi Moore's LL+P students were proud to see their creations on display in the hall at the Courthouse. Penelope Poor's family tribute to her inspired work generously donated all sales to the Courthouse for a total of \$5100 for 2023 so far.



This year's online auction of donated items from artwork to local business and services gift cards to antiques and more broke all records bringing in over \$13,000! Thanks to all who donated and all who shopped!



Great leadership, a creative cook, awesome new tents, a big physical education grant, a thriving Theater Camp, and a huge art show made the free LL+P a brilliant 6 hours/ day experience for 170 K-9 area youth and 16 high school and college-aged counselors employed!

Alexis Keenan and Tanya Carney led the way as Co-Directors. As always, Kim Gariepy provided continuity. Heidi McCauliffe managed the LL+P Garden. Stacey Riche made yummy and fun lunches. The "Let's Get Physical" grant from the Washington County Youth Bureau provided new sports, dance, yoga and hiking. Gabi Moore's art program filled the Courthouse with an exhibit dedicated to students' art. Fort Salem Theater's LL+P production of "The Little Mermaid" blew us away! Thanks to EVERYONE for your support!



Ending Salem's annual July 4th parade at a carnival at the Courthouse is the start of a new and festive tradition!!! The visiting German orchestra kicked off the evening on the Courthouse steps while Jay's DJ service kept folks dancing

even in the rain! New games like Flickin' Chicken and Racing Cows mixed with old favorites like the Dime Pitch, Cake Walk and Dunk Booth. A bounce house, double water slide, exotic fortune teller, Bob Yarborough Magic complete with balloon animals, face painting, a vintage hand-carved popcorn cart, sno-cones and other foods were among the fun and interesting offerings that filled the Courthouse campus and entertained the huge crowd that flocked there from Main Street to join the festivities. The event pulled in over \$5,500 from the sale of game tickets and brought scores of new faces to the Courthouse among the over 500 participants.



Summer 2023 in the Battenkill Kitchen was BUSY. Under the guidance of Stacy Riche, The Kitchen became "Food Central," serving 110-120 lunches and snacks per day, Monday through Friday to the Lunch, Learn and Play participants. Yes, there was

a budget for the food, but there were also gracious donors: Michael Nolan's Dairy Farm, donating 16 lbs. of beef; Jim and Karen Sheldon donating 8 lbs. cheddar cheese and butter; and Jennifer Baylor donating 12 lbs. beef.

In July, The Kitchen also became the hub for the annual Al Fresco Dinner. In August there is a steady use of the certified Kitchen by 12 renters, producing Tomato Salsa, jams and jellies, BBQ sauce, quiches, soup broth, and dried mushrooms for the area farmers markets.



The Courthouse Community Garden is in full bloom! This year's revamp created 24 plots using volunteerpower and no-till methods to fight weeds and build healthy soil. These plots were cultivated by 13 gardeners

with diverse plantings of vegetables, herbs, and flowers. Pumpkins planted by Salem's 4th graders are on track for October's Trunks & Treats, and the Food Pantry plots produced enough (so far!) for four deliveries of organic onions, kale, scallions, dill, chard, and the pantry's most requested vegetable - green beans. As part of a grant secured by As part of a grant Woerner Assemblywoman Carrie Woerner for the ongoing preservation and renovation of the Historic Salem Courthouse, Albany Master craftsman Eugene Lugowski repaired the cracks

and holes in the ceiling plaster in the courtroom. Other parts of the grant have made the heating system more efficient, repaired brickwork, and replaced a roof that connects the Jail to the Courthouse. Future plans are to make improvements to the Great Hall, where many exhibits and gatherings take place.



Nearly 200 guests enjoyed a perfect evening at Al Fresco 2023, the Courthouse's major fundraiser. Chef Michael Mahar and a team of dedicated Nearly 200 guests enjoyed a volunteers prepared a delicious meal including many favorite items, from foods provided by

local farms Juniper Hill, Benard Farms, Owl Wood, and Hand Melon Farm. Noosh'Anna's gorgeous hors d'oeuvres table and a beautiful wine and beer cart also graced the grounds. Entertainment was provided by the David Cuite Jazz Trio, plus youth performers from Little Mermaid Ir., and a tribute to Ralph Lee, the late founder of Mettawee River Theater Company, for his gift of many years of the magical performances by his massive puppets. This year's annual dinner netted \$20,000!

The Historic Salem Courthouse partnered with other entities to host these community activities:

- * Ca. 25 attendees enjoyed each of 3 Story Court events which started with a free supper. Longtime Salem area residents then shared their recollections and experiences of living in the area.
- * Hope and Healing of Hudson Falls, NY provided Narcan training.
- * Attendance: 20 for a Community Conversations discussion on the subject of Democracy. Sponsoring this event facilitated the receipt of a grant from Humanities NY for the upcoming series, Serious **Side of Food** (see front panel).
- * The Shoppe Off Broadway sponsored a concert by the Zucchini Brothers and a Goat Soap Workshop and Bath Bomb Workshop for kids.
- ★ Glens Falls National Bank in partnership with Herzog Law Firm and Washington County Sheriffs department presented an educational program about Fraud.
